THE NEW CONSTITUTION. We present to our readers th week an authentic copy of the new constitution, and bespeak for it a careful perusal by every voter in the county. We hope to find room before the day of election for the old constitution, so that our subscribers may be able to compare the two documents, and then vote understand-

ingly. There are some features of the new constitution of which we do not approve, but as a whole we think i a great improvement upon the old

We believe the Convention erred in not submitting the instrument in separate sections. Again, the application of the principle of minority representation, or "free vote," w believe contrary to the spirit of ou institutions. In a republican government the majority should rule, but by this system of voting, which i nearly as bad as Buckalew's cumula tive system, a small minority car have nearly as much influence in shaping the policy of the county or State, as the large majority. Neither do we endorse the action of the Convention in doing away to a great extent, at least, with the secret ballot. Every member of the election board can under the system adopted, know how every man votes. This provision will be regarded as an at tempt to tamper with the secrecy of the ballots.

The section which provides for ad ditional members of the Legislature is in our opinion imperfect. The number has not been increased suffisought to be remedied. The additional expense incident to the incroase, however, has been averted by providing for biennial sessions. But there are grave doubts whether, one session in two years wil lmeet the wants of a great State like ours.

We have adverted to the above faults of the Constitution, not for the purpose of inducing any one to vote against it, because, we said in the out et, we are decidedly in favor of it, and hope to see it largely adopted, because it does away with all special raplion, and giving the time now devoted to local laws, to the consideration of public affairs.
