J. S. Stewart. The report of D'A. Over-TON, the Superintendent of the Sunday-school. showed a sound growth and gratifying prosperity. In 1870 the number of teachers and scholars was 138; in 1874 the number is 265. During the four years there has been expended on the school the sum of \$1,269, while the school has contributed for benevolent purposes the sum

The report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was read by Mr. N. N. Barre, jr. This Society has been in existence only two years. During this time they have fraised \$735. The Society supports a female missionary, Mrs. Ds HEER, at Corisco, West Africa: and two mission bands connected with it, and composed of young girls and children, support each pupil in Mrs. Dz Hzzn's school.
