"Postal cards upon which are written any obscene, vulgar, indecent, or profane language of any scurrilous or opprobrious epithets, are unmailable.
"When such cards are discovered, either at
the office of mailing or delivery, they must be

destroyed.

"The pasting of anything whatever on a postal card renders it unmailable as a postal card, and subjects it to letter postage, and it not prepaid one full rate (3 cents) it should not oe forwarded; but it by inadvertance it reaches ts destination, it should be rated with double efter rates, to be collected on delivery."
