DEATH OF REV. THOMAS SHEARDOWN. Father Shrandown, for many years past the pastor of the Troy Baptist Church, died in that rillage on Thursday evening. He was quite a emarkable man, and possessed of more than ordinary ability. His "Life," which was pubished some years since, had an extensive sale, and brought him prominently before the public n this section. Although he had many times been brought near to doath's door, he preserve ed his vigor and vitality to the last. A corresp ondent of the Elmira Advertiser gives the following interesting sketch of his well spent life, and it will be read with interest, especially by those who knew the good man personally:

"He was one of the landmarks, for a radius of one hundred miles from Elmira. We do well to pause a moment at his grave. He was born Nov. 4, 1791, in the county of Lincoln, England. His father died when Thomas was eleven years old. His mother lived till some time after his arrival in America. He was converted and joined the liaptist Church at Dagger Lane, in Hull, England.
