"This venerable church, Rev. D. D. Gray, pastor, celebrated its eightieth anniversary on the 21th of May, 1874. The following extract from their last annual letter to the Wyoming Association, will be read with interest:

"On our eightieth anniversary, it was ascertained that the church had, during its entire existence, received 500 by baptism, 118 by letter, 5 by experience, and 21 by restoration, making a total increase of 644. During the same time there has been a decrease from all causes of 439, leaving a membership of 205.

"By a strange coincidence it happened that the eightieth anniversary of the church, and the fortieth anniversary of the pastor's ministry, occurred on the same day, affording us an opportunity of improving both occasions in one. The following note from the pastor's journal, made at the time, may not be uninteresting: "I was licensed to preach by the Brain-"This venerable church, Rev. D. D. Gray,

journal, made at the time, may not be uninteresting: "I was licensed to preach by the Braintim Church, May 24, 1834. Was ordained at Montrose, Aug. 26, 1836. Have lost nearly three years of time by sickness. Have preached in all 4,393 sermons; since settling with this people, 2,513. Baptized over 700. Married 309 couples. Numper of funerals unknown—probably about 1,500. And now, after so long an experience of God's compassion, love and care, neither church nor pastor is disposed to distrust His faithfulness or forsake His cause."
