

AGRICULTURAL.
A YEAST OPERATOR.
1. Mrs. W. A. Tower of Lexington, Mass., took the first premium offered by the Middlesex Agricultural Society for the best unbaked wheat flour bread made the following season concerning yeast used.
For yeast I take four mashed potatoes, I keep white sugar, 1 cup flour, and pour on this mixture 1 quart scalding water in which a handful of hops has been boiled; then add 1 pint lukewarm water, stir, strain and let it stand in a warm place for 24 hours.
2. Mrs. L. O. M. of North Carolina, says the easiest and quickest way to make yeast is: Wash and pare a half dozen potatoes; boil them till perfectly done; mash them thoroughly; add a handful of flour and pour on enough of the water in which they were boiled to make a batter; stir this aside until it is lukewarm and then stir in enough yeast to make it rise. This is put near the fire in winter or in a warm place in summer. It will rise; it is then set in a cool place and is ready for use. By this method it can be made ready for use in three or four hours.
3. Dora L. Park contributes the following: Six large potatoes, pared and grated fine; 1 large spoonful salt; half teacup white sugar; 2 quart water, poured on the other ingredients, boiling hot and stirred thoroughly; when cool, stir in a teacup of yeast.
4. "A Pennsylvania" sends the following for making good yeast cakes: "To a quart of cold water add a good handful of hops and let them boil; then strain; set over the fire and pour in a pint of sugar and water—put of a quart of oat—throughly; when cool enough, add some home-made yeast and let it rise until it is one perfect foam; then thicken well with corn meal and make out into cakes immediately and bake quickly and thoroughly, so that the corn meal will be kept sweet. Care must be taken, if dried near a stove, that it is not too hot; 100 degrees is hot enough and 90 degrees will do nicely."
5. "Roma" writes the following: "Take one-half dozen potatoes; wash them, boil, and mash through a colander; one-half teacup hops, boiled in a quart of water; strain the water; the hops are boiled in into the mashed potatoes; add one teacup flour or enough to make it as stiff as pancake batter; after it becomes cool, add a teacup of home made yeast of any kind; set in warm place until light, which will be in six or eight hours; when light, turn the batter in Indian meal and rub until dry enough to remain in small lumps; put in pans to dry. I never make them into cakes, as they are liable to sour."
6. Mrs. S. S. sends us her mode, and says the resulting cakes she prefers to any she ever bought. "Take at least two yeast cakes (which is more than I use for a batch of bread, as I only take one or one and a half for three or four times of bread) put them in a quart of water and let them soak up; set them where they will keep warm; then put a quart of boiling water in a kettle over the fire; throw in a handful of salt and stir in Indian meal enough to make a rather thin mass. Just let it cook while you are stirring in the yeast, so that it only wants to scald; set it where it will be hot enough to scald the yeast; then put the cakes which have been soaked as above, in an hour, mixing them thoroughly with a spoon or your hand, which is better; cover them and let them remain in the kettle by the side of the stove, all night; in the morning, mix in meat carefully to make them stiff enough to roll up in a long roll and cut into cakes a half inch thick; dry on a wire sieve; you can hang it up behind the stove. Keep the air from them and keep them warm till you see they begin to rise; after that they will need no more care until perfectly dry, unless it be in cold weather; then, of course, they must not be left where they will get chilled. They do not want to be baked quite as stiff as dry cakes, if they are to be dried on plates; and they dry rapidly if they do not sour."
7. The following is from Mrs. D.: "Take one bowl of hops, put into a spider and fill up with water; let them boil for an hour or more, keeping it full of water; then strain the liquor into a small pan, add a good teacup of salt, a handful of flour, and stir in Indian meal to the consistency of a batter. Let it stand until lukewarm, then stir in your yeast and cover up warm to rise. When it has risen, mix with Indian meal and make it into rolls and slice off in cakes and lay them on your six board to dry. Let them stand on a small table in the kitchen, turn every day, and when they get in a bag and hang up for a year, I make three or four times a year and have never failed of having nice ones."—*Rural New Yorker.*
