WHILE we are all prone to find fault with the innumerable matters, and declare the like was never before known, it may well be refresh our memories in regard to the matter. A contributor to the Cleveland Herald sends the following note to that paper, concerning the spring of 1873:

In looking over your issue of last evening I find the story of 1873 which you call a

wintry (less snow) as this. I send it to you as I find it in my book, from April 21 to May 19, 1873:

The past winter has been long and cold; not much spring weather up to this. Cold winds, blowing from the north, and a few days of rain, in the beginning of October, date. Peaches, Isabella grapes, and other fruits were killed.

April 24, 1873—Cold and wintry.

April 23, 1873—Snow and frost this morning; cold and wild snow storm all day.

April 27, 1873—Snow; last night only. April 28, 1873—Cold and frost.

April 29, 1873—Frost this morning; sun bright. May 1, 1873—Some warmer.

May 13, 1873—Thunder storm last night; cold to-day.

May 17, 1873—Snowing. May 17, 1873—Cold and frosty all this week; a white frost this morning.

May 18, 1873—White frost this morning; cold.

May 19, 1873—Spring weather commenced.
