IMPORTANT TO NEWLY ELECTED OFFICERS.—The following law passed by the Legislature last winter, and approved by the Governor on the 10th of March, 1917, changing the time at which township officers enter upon the discharge of their duties, seems to have been overlooked by many of our newly elected officers. It is as follows: "The discharge of their duties shall commence on the first of April."
