when a liorse or carriage is let out for hire, for the purpose of performing a par-ticular journey, the party letting warrants the horse or carriage fit and competent for such a journey. If the hirer treats the horse carriage as any prudent man would do, he is not answerable for any damage that either may receive. But he must use the horse for the purpose for which he hired him. For instance, a iorse hired for saddle must not be used in harness. If the hirer violates this express condition of the contract, he is lia-But if he is robbed of it by highwaymen, when traveling the usual road at usual hours, he cannot be held for damages.
