Resolved, That we believe that intem perance is the greatest curse that now af-flicts our State and country. Resolved, That we believe it to be the duty of every individual to do all in his power to remove it from our land, Resolved, That we believe our license system to be wrong in principle, and exceedingly pernicious in practice; that it gives legal sanction and protection to a traffic which should be prohibited by law.
