Passmore then grappled with the burglar and they had it hand to hand for some time, but the thief finally broke away and ran out of a door left

open by his companion.

Passmore was disappointed at the turn of events, but this morning he exhibited terrible evidences of his desperate fight. He was covered with blood from head to foot which flowed from wounds he had given his assailants. He had the two revolvers he captured, and it is believed that they were taken from Roat's store, at Kingston, which was burglarized a few nights ago. If Passmore's revolver had een in working order, there is no doubt ut that the world would have been well rid of two desperate men.
