ORDER OF FAIR.

FIRST DAY.

Forenoon—Entries in all the Departments. All articles or animals intended for competition must be on the ground and in their proper places. Exhibitors, upon receiving their cards from the Secretary, will report to the Superintendent of the Department to which the entry belongs, by whom the places for exhibition will be assigned.
Afternoon—2 P. M. General opening of the Exhibition.

SECOND DAY.

Forenoon—Judges will commence their examination at 10 o'clock.
Afternoon—All awards must be filed with the Secretary. The annual address will be delivered at 2 o'clock. Base ball matches on the grounds of the Society at 3 o'clock.

THIRD DAY.

Exhibition of all prize animals on the track. Three and a half o'clock.—Sales of animals and articles by auction and otherwise, will take place during the afternoon.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The payment of one dollar constitutes any person a member of the Society, and entitles him or her to admission to the Fair, and to enter articles or animals for premiums.
2. All articles or animals entered for competition must be on the ground by two o'clock on the first day of the Fair, and remain until three o'clock of the last day, unless special permission be given by the Superintendent to remove them sooner. Articles intended for exhibition only may be entered at any time.
3. All articles or animals must be entered in the Secretary's books, and all persons desiring to compete for premiums are required to furnish a written list of such articles or animals to the Secretary by letter.
4. Entries for horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, dairy products and grain will close on the 23d day of September. All other articles will be received until two o'clock of the first day.
5. Persons entering cattle to compete as thoroughbreds must file with the Secretary evidence of pedigree at time of entry.
6. All entries must be made in the name of the

owner or owners, and no premiums will be awarded to any person not the owner of the article exhibited.
7. Goods and stock must be delivered upon the ground and put in place by the exhibitors, and removed by them at the close of the Fair.
8. No animal can compete in more than one class or division except for herd, family, or special premium.
9. All animals will be shown in the ring, and exhibitors must be ready to bring them out when called for.

JUDGES.

10. Judges are desired to report and have their names entered at the business office as soon as they arrive, and must report to the Superintendent of the department in which they are to act. Judges are desired to examine the Premium List with particular care.

11. Judges will in no case award a premium when there is no merit, or for articles or animals of ordinary or inferior qualities, and only those provided by the Premium List. When articles of merit superior in their character are presented, not named in list, the Judges are requested to note them particularly in their report, and make such recommendations to the Board of Managers as they shall deem proper.

12. Judges will be provided with ribbons and cards indicating the first, second and special premiums, and they shall attach the ribbons or cards upon the articles they award prizes at the places of examination.

13. No person shall act as Judge upon any class of articles or animals in which he or she, or any member of his or her family, is a competitor; and any person appointed Judge and declining to act, is requested to notify the Secretary before the fifteenth of September.

14. Judges are requested to make their reports to the Secretary at the business office immediately after their awards are made.

15. The diploma of the Society is awarded as an evidence of superior merit.

16. Premiums awarded to animals will be designated by ribbons, to wit: First premium, *Red*; second premium *Blue*. On other articles the premiums will be designated by card.

17. Any person dissatisfied with the awards of a committee shall have the right of appeal to the Board of Managers, whose decision shall be final.
18. Premiums not called for within ninety days will be considered donated to the Society.

19. Entries may be made by addressing the Secretary, Towanda, Pa., to whom all inquiries may be addressed.

20. Competitions for premiums open to all.

TICKETS.

21. Single admission tickets, 25 cents. All occupants of carriages will be charged personal entrance fee.

22. No extra charge will be made for the admission of carriages and other vehicles conveying persons to and from the fair.

23. The officers of the Fair shall wear badges as follows: President, *white rosette*; Secretaries, *blue*; Treasurer, *yellow*; Department Managers, *red and white*; Members of Executive Committee, *red, white and blue*; Police, *red*. Assistants will wear ribbons of the same color as the principals to which they belong.

24. Exhibitors will receive an exhibitor's ticket entitling one person to admission during the Fair, but no other tickets.

25. Life Membership, \$10. Life Members will be furnished with a badge, which will entitle such Life Member, his wife, minor children and team to admission.

26. The President will be Chief of Police, and have charge of track and grounds.

SHOWS, BOOTHS, ETC.

Regulations as to shows, booths, &c., in the neighborhood of the Fair Grounds.

1. No booths or tents for shows or exhibitions, or for sale of refreshments or victuals, or for any other purpose, shall be erected within two hundred yards of the Fair Grounds without permission, in writing, of the President.

2. In case any such booths or tents be erected, or attempted to be erected without such permission, it shall be the duty of the Police of the Society to order the same to be removed, or that the building be stopped, and in case their orders shall be disregarded, to arrest the offenders, who will be prosecuted according to law. Any privilege granted by the Society for the sale of refreshments or other articles, or for any other purpose, will be subject to be revoked if the privilege is abused or the condition of the same violated.
