Exhibitors, upon receiving their cards from the Secretary, will report to the Superintendent of the Department to which the entry belongs, by whom the places for exhibition will be assigned.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The payment of one dollar constitutes any peron a member of the Society, and entitles him or

son a member of the Society, and entitles him r bur to admission to the Fair, and to enter articles of animals for premiums. 2. At articles or animals entered for composi-tion must be or the ground by two o'clock on the airst day of the Fair, and remain until three o'clock of the last day, unless special permission be given by the Superingendent to remove them sooner. Ar-ticles intended for exhibition only may be entered at a fit time.

owner or owners, and no premiums will be awarded to any person not the owner of the article exhibited.

7. Goods and stock must be delivered upon the ground and put in place by the exhibitors, and removed by them at the closs of the Fair;

8. No animal can compete in more than one class or division except for herd, family, or special premium.

9. All animals will be shown in the ring, and exhibitors must e ready to bring them out when called for.

JUDGES, 10. Judges are desired to report and have their pames entered at the business office as soon as they arrive, and must report to the Superintendent of the department in which they are to act. Judges are desired to examine the Premium List with par-

ticular care.

11. Judges will in no case award a premium when there is no merit, or for articles or admais of ordinary or inferior qualities, and only those provided by the Premium List. When articles of merit superior in their character are presented, not named in list, the Judges are requested to note them particularly in their report, and make such recomendations to the Board of Managers as they shall deem proper.

12. Judges wil be provided with ribbons and cards indicating the first, second and special premiums, and they shall attach the ribbons or cards upon the articles they award prizes at the places of examination.

13. No person shall act as Judge upon any class of articles or animals in which he or she, or any member of his or her family, is a competitor; and, any person appointed Judee and declining to act, B requested to notify the Secretary before the fifteenth of September.

14. Judges are requested to make their reports to the Secretary at the business office immediately after their awards are made.

15. The diploma of the Seciety is awarded as an evidence of superior merit.

16. Premi awa awarded to animals will be designated by ribbons, to with: First premium. Red.

16. Premi mis awarded to animals will be designated by ribbons, to wild. First premium Red; second premium Blue. On other articles the premiums will be designated by card.
17. Any person dissatisfied with the awards of a committee shall have the right of appeal to the Board of Managers, whose decision shall be final.
18. Premiums not called for within ninety days will be considered donated to the Society.

TICKETS.

21. Single admission tickets, 25 cents: All occupants of carriages will be charged personal entrance ted.

22. No extra charge will be made for the admission of carriages and other vehicles conveying persons to and from the fair.

23. The officers of the Fair shall wear badges as follows: President, white rosette: Secretaries blue: Treasurer, yellow: Department Managers, oxed and white: Members of Executive Committee, red, white and blue: Police, red. Assistants will wear ribons of the same color as the principals to which they belong.

25. Life Membership, \$10. Life Members will be furnished with a badge, which will entitle such Life Member, his wile, minor children and team to

26. The President will be Chief of Police, and have charge of track and grounds.

2. In case any such booths or tents be creeted, or attempted to be erected without such permission, in writing, of the President.

3. All principles or animals to the Secretary by letter.

4. Entries for horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, dairy products and grain will close on the 23d day of September. All other articles will be received until two o'clock of the first day.
