



Storing of Fodder-Corn. The succulence of green corn-stalks renders them difficult to dry thoroughly. To stow away uncured corn-fodder in stacks or barns, without precautions to prevent moulding, is unsafe. On one sheep in every ten of the flock put a bell of usual size for sheep. The instinct of the dog prompts him to do all his acts on the sly, stealthy manner; his attacks upon sheep are most frequently made at night while they are at rest, and the simultaneous jingling of all the bells strikes terror to the dogs; they tuin their tails and leave the sheep, fearing the noise of the bells will lead to their exposure.
