

For a number of years we have made it a practice to dig potatoes late, except those needed for table use, or for the market. There is a diversity of opinion which exists on the subject, however, among some of our best farmers, some believing that early digging prevents rot, while others believe that a potato once diseased will rot whether in or out of the ground. If this is true, we have a strong argument in favor of late digging, as the poor diseased potatoes will have rotted in the ground, where they will improve the fertility of the soil, rather than infect the cellar with noxious odors. We have noticed that potatoes dug early and stored in the cellar, are as likely to rot, as those left in the ground until
