

Some of the progressive farmers in the vicinity of Troy, having seed furnished them by the Commissioner of Agriculture, have experimented with very favorable results to which the sample and their statements testifv. They have associated in the purchase of the necessary apparatus for the manufacture of the sorgham from the cane, which is in operation at East Troy. From the cane grown on thirty-six square rods of ground, seventy gallons of the sorghum, like the sample, was produced, which was very thick in quality and of zood flavor.
