IT is reported that, on a recent visit to New Guinea, Captain Lawson made the interesting geographical discovery that Mount Hercules has an altitude of 32,786 feet, thus being more than 3,000 feet -higher than Mount Everest, which has for a considerable time been regarded as the tallest mountain in the world.

A FRENCH explorer of the banks of the Niger announces the finding of a new vine, which he believes must be of great economical value, as it is easily cultivated and the grapes are excellent and abundant. He suggests that this vine may be found to resist the phylloxers.

A FRENCH sacant, M. Laliman, has found that an oil can be distilled from American grape-vines which will not congeal at any temperature above eight degrees fabrenheit, while other oils are solid at twenty-seven degrees. He therefore concludes that this oil must be valuable for watch-making and similar purposes.

In a girl who lately died at Caen, France, the whole of the thoracic and abdominal organs were found completely in verted, the heart being at the right side and the liver at the left, while the usual position of the latter was occupied by the stomach and the spleen.

"NARCOLEPSY" is the name given a rare form of disease by M. Galineau, who has called attention to a case of it. The persons suffering from it may fall asleep at any moment, their sleep lasting only a few minutes. MR. R. J. JENKINS, F. R. A. S., has endeavored to show a very remarkable effect of the planet Venus upon the earth. The present British Astronomer Royal proved, many years ago that the disturbing effect of this planet was so great that the earth was materially pulled from its orbit. Mr. Jenkins shows that it is to this action that we must look for an explanation the cold waves which occur on an aver age, every eight years—as in 1829, 1837, 1845, 1855, 1863, 1871, 1879-and that for the next forty years the temperature will be below the average. He states that a heat wave has been observed to pass over the earth every twelve years nearly contemporary with the arrival of the planet Jupiter at its perihelion; such a wave being now close at hand.

By inoculating animals with vaccine taken from an infected one, M. Toussaint has succeeded in rendering them secure against epidemics, such as pleuro-pneumonia, etc. It will be remembered that M. Pasteur was lately successful in vaocinating poultry, and thus protecting them against attacks of the malady, known as chicken cholora.

THE Red Sea owes its name to the dark red color given certain portions of it by a minute, thread-like alga. Similar microscopic plants are found obscuring or coloring the water in various portions of the world. In other cases, as in the Gulf of California, a red shade is imparted to the sea by its minute animal inhabitants.

Another Swiss lake village, assigned by experts to the age of aronze, has been discovered near Neuchatle. Beveral millstones, some in an incomplete state, have brought to light, from which it is inferred that the place, may have been the seat of a manufactory of these articles. 





Lice on Stock.

A number of letters ask for remedies for lousy stock. Vermin of some kind very frequently infest domestic animals; they are most frequently of the louse type; small parasitic animals that must be removed by the application of some insecticide. A number of substances have been used to a greater or less extent, One pound of tobacco and six ounces of borax boiled in two quarts of water, to which soft soap enough is added to make a thick paste, has proved a good vermin salve. A mixture of carbonic acid and soft soap in the proportion of one to four makes a compound easy to apply and very effectual. Shortly after, the parts to which the soap mixture lard oil, equal parts, with a little car-

bolic acid, is, perhaps, the most convenient mixture to make, and effectual in its application. Animals that are effected with vermin need better care and higher feeding in order to overcome the drain that those parasites make upon the system.—American Agriculturist.
