A MYSTERIOUS LAKE.

Laurel Hill is one of the highest of th range of mountains extending from Liberty to Ralston. It was covered with ice and the peculiarity about it was that the edges appeared banked up, as if by the hands of man. The surveyor found his way home, but although he has made several attemps, has never been able to find the lake again. Another man came upon the lake in the spring and noticed many trout in the water. He observed the same peculiarity in its banks as re marked by the other. Others have come upon the lake when out of their way and all give the same account of it. Parties have been organized for the purpose of finding it, but their search has always proved futile. Some of the old German people who live just north of the moun tains are strong believers in witchcraft and aver that the lake is the work of evi spirits. Whether such a body of wate exists or whether it is only in the imaginings of easily frightened people lost in the woods, it is certain that the "Myste rious Lake" is the subject of much speculation among the people who live in the vicinity of Laurel Hill .- Cinton Sentinel.



Management of Orchards. It is surprising how few reallygood orchards we are able to find in so good an apple section as this. It would seem that the majority of farmers have an idea that a fruit tree after it is once set out needs no further attention, and hence many or-chards are left to follow the inclina-

tions of their own wild nature. The orchard is a portion of the farm that too often suffers neglect. Fruit trees whose trunks and branches are disfigured with lusty sprouts and black dead limbs, which make them unpleasant to the eye of the thritty, neat farmer, are too frequently seen. They indicate carelessness on the part of the owner which is poor economy, for a little labor and expense expended on an orchard each year will be well spent. A good orchard with proper man-

agement will usually pay as good a percentage on the investment as ordinary farm crops. The cost of tak-ing care of the fruit trees is but trifling compared with the expense of growing other crops, but it will not do to neglect them altogether. Manure must be applied if the trees are to yield good crops. Some sort of cultivation is also highly beneficial

with most soils. We believe there is no better way of manuring and cultivating an orchard than to use it as a hog pasture. Swine confined in an orchard will not only keep the soil about the trees well manured and tolerably well cultivated, but they will also do great good by destroying destructive insects which are in the early fallen and Breath, Headache, apples, or in the ground beneath the trees. Fruit trees should be pruned every year. The season is not so important provided it is not neglected. yet we have urged that the work be done during the mild days in winter, when there is little else to do.

The Benefits of Ensilage. The pseservation of green todder by the system of ensilage has become a subject of much interest and comment. On many farms throughout the country the system is being followed with good results, and many who have had practical experience with the subject report decided advantages for it. Others, however, in writing concerning ensilage, have said things that tend to discourage farmers from trying this new method of saving fodder. Our opinion of the question, we are sorry to say, is not founded on personal experience, but from what we have gathered from the experience of others as communicated to the agricultural ess. From what we can learn concerning the unsilage, we are inclined to believe that the system would prove profitable to many farmers in this locality. It is a question of vast importance with many farmers who own high priced land near the city, how they shall manage their farms to make them pay a reasonable percentage on their value. We have found it utterly impossible to make our farms do this by following the common system of farming—raising stock and grains. It is in such cases, we believe, where the system of ensilage will yield the best results. In localities where land is cheap and labor high there is less room for a margin, and it is doubtless cheaper to winter stock in the usual way, on dry fodder and grains. Good hay can nearly always be disposed of by farmers living near the city at paying prices. If, then, we can make green fodder, preserved, by the system of ensilage, take the place of hay, we will have a crop to put upon the market-which we have heretofore consumed at home. The value of the system, to farmers must depend on the feeding value of the fodder as it is taken from the silos, as compared with good hay or dry corn fodder. It has been stated by good authority that two tons of ensilage corn fodder are worth as much as one ton of good timothy hay. Our authority is John M. Bailey, of Winning Farm." Billerica, Massa-

Omit the potash unless you can get the pure article. Druggists usually keep it. In this ratio the pickle can be increased to any quantity desired. Let these be boiled together until all the dirt from the sugar rises to the top and is skimmed off. Then throw it into a tub to cool, and when cold pour it over your beef or pork.
