trees. It is better to buy cions than to use any poor ones. Root grafting is done during the winter, and the young stocks should be in a convenient place. The trees are taken from the ground before they freeze, asorted, tied in bundles, and then placed in boxes with the roots covered with soil and put in a cellar. The seeds of trees for spring planting are best preserved by mixing them with sand and placing the boxes in a cool dry place out of the way of the mice. The forces and garden of the orchard and nursery should be in good order at all times, and especially at this season, when a stray animal may get in and do serious damage.—*American Agriculturist for November.*
