ABOUT THE CHURCHES. MISSIONARY INDISCRETION. - The extreme bad taste and want of discretion shown by many missionaries very frequently, instead of accomplishing, only defeats the object they have in view. The walls in one of the principle thoroughfares of Calcuttar were covered recently with placards in which some missionaries exposed the Hindoo religion to ridicule, while extolling their own faith. This leads the Indian Mirror, a newspaper of that city, to say: "Unchristian and ungentlemanly strictures on the religious belief of the preponderating majority of the Indian population were printed by hand on cloth, behind which a light was placed to make the printed characters more distinctly legible. Much may be forgiven to missionaries, who mean well, but do not always act wisely. It is free to them to hold any opinions, however extreme; but a little exercise of common sense should LYDIÁ E. PINKHAM'S convince them that the exhibition of them is better reserved for the pulpit than on the walls of public thoroughfares, where it is calculated to give pain and offence to a very large proportion of their fellow-citizens. The Hindoos do not obtrude their religious opinions on other men, and they are surely entitled to follow out those opinions without molestation and without exposure to ridicule."

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


