ABOUT THE CHURCHES.

Nor long ago, in-the ancient priory church at Smithtield, England, of St. Bartholomew the Great-a church which dates back to 1102-a special Advent service was held, at which the offertory was devoted to the funds of the St. Bartholomew Rahere Almonry, a revival of "Ye antiente fraternitie of ye Rahere Almoners." According to the legend, "Rahere of good remembrance, minstrel and jester to King Henry I, after a somewhat misspent, though not specially faulty, life, coveted to do the worthy fruits of penance." He not only founded a church and hospital in honor of St. Bartholomew. who, according to the story, had appeared to him when he was returning from a pilgrimage to Rome, but instituted the priory alms which, by a fraternity of almoners, were "distributed to the great comforting of all sick and needy people who had claim thereto," until the time of Henry III. The suffering caused by the great snowstorm and gale of the 18th of January last suggested to one of the church wardens the revival of this frater uity of Rahere Almoners.




