And Whereas, It is represented that a large number, if not a majority of the citizens of this Commonwealth, are deeply im. pressed with the necessity of the passage of Prohibitory Liquor Law:

And whereas, It is impossible to obtain certain indication of popular sentiment relating thereto by means of petitions and remonstrances : Therefore,

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by theauthority of the same, That the qualified voters of this Commonwealth are hereby authorized, at the places for holding the general elections in their respective wards, boroughs and townships, on the second Tuesday of October next, to vote for and against a law which shall entirely prohibit by proper and constitutional regulations and penalties, the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, except for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and artistical purposes.

SECTION 2. 
