SECOND DISPATCEL. PORTLAND, June 3. - At ten o'clock last night a moisy mole assembled about the building used as the city liquor agency, and attempted to-break in and destroy the liquor. The po-Some sixty gentlemen of the Democratic lice attempted to preserve the peace, and the crowd becoming more threatening, two military companies were called out. It was thought the matter would end quietly.

TEIRD DISPATCH

At a late hour the mob broke into the building, when the military drawn up opposite, fired a volley, killing Ephraim Robbins, of Eastport, and wounding several others, some se-verely. A squad of the Rifle Guard then charged the crowd with bayonets, which rapidly dispersed. One old gentleman, said to be quietly on his way home, received a severe. bayonet wound. A few arrests were made, when the mob entirely dispersed. Another man is reported dead, having been wounded severely.

BOSTON. June 4 .- The Portland papers contain some additional particulars in regard to the liquor riot there on Saturday night. The attack apon the building where the liquor was stored was begun chiefly by boys, who threw stones, &c., when Mayor Dow appeared on the ground, flourishing a sword, at the head of two military companies, whom he had ordered out. The appearance of the Mayor and the military exasperated the crowd, who received them with groans and hisses. The Mayor then ordered the infantry to fire, but the captain refused to obey, saying that the circumstrances did not call for such a measure. The rifle guard soon afterward appeared, when the mob having burst open the door of the liquor rooms, a section of the company, by order of the Houghton, the know-nothing candidate, by Mayor, fired. One person was killed and six or seven persons were wounded.

A public meeting was called for Monday morning, to investigate the fair.

PORTLAND, Me., June 4.-The excitement. here to day, growing out of the liquor riot on Saturday night, is intense. Business is almost entirely suspended. A public meeting has been called for the purpose of instituting measures to prosecute those who gave orders.

PORTLAND, June 4 .- A committee of citizens has been appointed to investigate the affair, and another to wait on the Mayor and request him to resign.

The funeral of Robbins, the man who was shot by the military, took place this afternoon and was followed to the grave by an immense procession. A large number of special police. are on duty to-mght.

The Argus comments with severity uponthe course of Mr. Dow in the execution of the liquor law, which, it alleges, has excited much. hostile feeling against him. It expresses the belief that the purpose of the people assembled was only to spill some of the liquor which they believed to have been illegally obtained, and that if he had not appeared with the military, no serious harm would have been done.

A letter from that city, dated Monday night, A large number of arrests have been made by the city authorities, among whom is Lieut. E. M. Patten, of the "Rifle Corps," whose only stated, prevails to a serious extent. The city act was to try to save life by warning the people of the presence of the military. He was taken at his residence, while quietly smoking a eigar in the garden, at midnight, by a file of armed soldiers with fixed bayonets. The public feeling, generally, is that of universal indignation against the Mayor, and a large portion of strong Maine law men denonnee the late event in the strongest terms. The public meeting this afternoon, at the City Hall, was immense. Quiet reigned, and it is evident that nothing but law without violence shall test the matter. Judge Wells presided at the meeting, which adopted the following resolutions: Resolved, That the conduct of Neal Dow, mayor of the city, in reference to his alleged illegal traffic in intoxicating liquors, should be subjected to a fair and impartial investigation. Resolved, That while we regret that the confidence of the people in the integrity of those primarily charged with the administration of justice is in a great measure weakened by the recent course of events which has invited opposition to the city authorities, we cannot justify any acts of violence or any breach of the people at any time, or by any unlawful assemblage. Resolved, That the shedding of blood by the order of the mayor can only be justified as an act of extreme necessity, and then only in conformity to legal principles-which necessity should be made so clear as to preclude the chance of any sense of injustice or feeling of revenge on the part of the friends of any man summarily put to death by violence.
