One Week Later from Europe. The English Excitement Against the United States Subsided-Nothing Important from the Seat of War-Rumors of Peace.

HALIFAX, Nov. 22. The Cunrad steamer Canada arrived here to-day at one o'clock, P. M., with Liverpool dates to Saturday, the 10th inst., at ten o'clock, A. M.

England.—The excitement respecting the probability of a war with the United States has quite subsided, and the leading journals, in one of which he preached until 1841. ashamed of the panic which they created, are attempting to excuse it and let themselves gently down by attributing the pretended hostile attitude of America to an election ruse on the part of the President and Cabinet. Intelligent Englishmen of all ranks express themselves pained and humiliated by the whole affair.

FRANCE. - Another false report has been put in circulation of an attempt to assassinate the Emperor.

The monthly statement of the Bank of France is stated as not unfavorable in its general character, though it shows a diminution of £1,. 000,000. Its notes in circulation have been largely reduced.

Spain.—Unitiently relations are arising be-tween Spain and England, partly in relation to the case of Mr. Boylan, a British subject, who was expelled from Cuba notwithstanding an agreement on the part of Spain to submit his grigganges to the arbitrarian of the Datish grievances to the arbitration of the British Consul at New Orleans. Great Britain demands an indemnity on Boylan's losses.

More Diplomacy.—It is reported from Berlin that Russia recently made a confidential communication to Prussia and Austria of her wish to renew negotiations; and that Bourguency went to Vienna with fresh instructions to meet the contingency of proposals from Russia. It was also further reported that Prince Gortschakoff and the Diplomatist from Vienna, with all the Russian ministers from the German courts, were certainly to meet the Czar at Warsaw about the middle of November, when the question of a renewal of negotiations will be settled. It is also stated that the Emperor of France is favorable to a renewal of negotia-

FROM THE SEAT OF WAR. - A French camp of 50,000 men is being formed in Silistria. The rumored battles near Simplieropol turn-

ed out to be faise.

From Sebastopol accounts say that the Russians projectiles reach almost every part of the city. A desultory fire was being kept up on both sides. The allies say that the Russians are making preparations for a retreat. St. Petersburg despatches say that the Crimean army has been provisioned for eight

The Vienna papers say that the Russian strength now in the Crimea is 200,000 men. Vienna, Nov. 9th.—Dispatches received at the Turkish embassy state that the bombardment of Nicholieff was commenced on the 29th ult., and continued the whole of the following day.; The result was not known.

ITALY.—The misunderstanding between Sardinia and Tuscany remains unsettled, and the departure of the Anglo Swiss Legion from Genoa for the Crimea has been countermanded. The correspondent of the London Post says that no doubt a revolutionary movement has broken out in Sicily. Several insurgents have been captured and shot. Arrests have been made at Palermo.

DENMARK.—It rumored that Russia accepts the office of mediator between Denmark and United States. Breadstuffs.—All descriptions of breadstuffs

COLOBED PEOPLE IN KANSAS.—The Free State Constitutional Convention of Kansas has adopted an article to submit to the vote of the people the propriety of the Legislature passing stringent laws for the exclusion of free colored people from the territory.

POTATOES FOR THE BOSTON MARKET.—Three vessels arrived at Boston on Monday morning from Nova Scotia, which brought 8,000 bushels of potatoes to that market.
