

tion of said mortgage or mortgages. With all the powers, rights and privileges, and under the same restrictions, as said company had and held the same. Provided, That no bond or obligation hereby authorized to be executed shall be for a less sum than one hundred dollars.

SECTION 2. That the time for the commencement of the work of construction of said railroad be and the same is hereby extended two years from the expiration thereof.

SECTION 3. That the last provision in the second section of this supplement to the act incorporating the Gettysburg railroad company be and the same is hereby repealed.

To Prevent Moths.
In the month of May beat your furs with an elastic stick, then wrap them in linen with pieces of camphor gum, box them up, and put in a dark place. Woolen goods should be preserved in the same way.
