A St. Joseph (Mo.) correspondent writing on the 23d of October, says: "Last night our gossips were thrown into ecstasies over an elopement, which certainly was one of a most extraordinary character. It seems that two young gentlemen were addressing a young belle up town, and that she smiled equally upon both. Yesterday morning she was to be married to one and laid night to the other, and, strange to say, kept both engagements. At 9 A. M. one bridegroom was made happy by her pledge of hand and heart, and at 9 P. M. the other was made happy by the possession of her person. They left last night, and were married at Bloomington, just twelve miles distant, and continued on their way to realms unknown."

Horrible Murder in Massachusetts. Boston, Nov. 8. - Peter Naughton and his wife were brutally murdered in their house, in Dudley, yesterday morning, or the night before, by some villain. Naughton was a respectable laboring man, an Irishman, and had accumulated some property. The gentleman for whom he worked, went to Naughton's house about ten o'clock, A. M., to inquire why he did not come to work, as usual; upon opening the door, he found the man and his wife lying side by side on the floor, dead, their bodies being mutilated in a horrible manner, their skulls having been dreadfully fractured, apparently with an axe, which was found in the room, with the handle broken. The room was covered with blood, and a chest had been broken open, in which it is supposed Naughton had some money. An infant, five months old, was lying unharmed in the bed, in an adjoining room. This is one of the most shocking murders ever perpetrated, and as yet no clue to the detection of the murderer has been obtained. It hardly seems possible that the guilty wretch can escape detection.

An Incident. One day last week, one of the engines on the line of the Columbia Railroad, named Kansas, ran off the track, and was thus placed in a decidedly awkward position. Word was sent up the road and an application made for another engine to restore her to the track. The only engine not in use at the time was the James Buchanan, which was at once despatched to the Kansas, and quickly drew her to the proper position.
