

Local Matters.

FIRE.—Last evening, about half-past eight o'clock, the cry of "Fire!" again resounded through our streets, and on the instant the town was "lighted up" as though by the burning of a large building in our midst.—The fire was found however to be some distance from town, and it proved to proceed from the stabling on property of Mr. JOSEPH WIBLE, occupied by Mr. JAMES DOLAN, sub-contractor on the Railroad, about two miles north-east of this place. With the stabling were consumed five good horses, a cow, several pigs, a carriage, a number of carts, and other property of less value. Two horses escaped, but somewhat injured. The loss falls heavily on Mr. Dolan, for whom there is much sympathy. It is not known how the fire originated.

Savings Fund Bill.

The following is a correct list of the Commissioners as it has been in the hands of our Representatives for nearly a month past, to be embraced in the act of incorporation when before the Senate, viz: Jacob Musselturn, Geo. Throne, Samuel Darbarow, William Culp, Eli Horner, Isaac E. Wierman, John Mickle, John Thorne, John Brough, David McConaughy, George Shryock, Andrew Heinzelman, Charles Horner, Henry Thomas, John Wofford, Edward B. The first section provides, that the persons named and "all and every person or persons hereafter becoming members in the manner hereinafter mentioned, shall be and are hereby created a corporation and body politic, by the name and style of the Farmers' and Mechanics' Savings Institution of Adams County." The persons named are, by the second section, appointed Commissioners for the sale of the capital stock, and the persons becoming Stockholders are to be the corporators.

The Institution is to be managed by "thirteen directors," chosen annually, and a President, who may be chosen from among their number—and other necessary officers.

The capital stock at first is \$39,000, with power to increase it to not exceeding \$100,000. The act not only withholds the power of issuing notes, but also banking and discounting privileges. It is, in most particulars, similar to the Chambersburg, Frederick, Hanover and other Savings Institutions in neighboring counties.

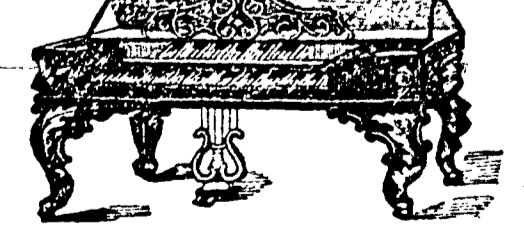
