The eyes of the nation have been so intensely fixed upon the respective fields of battle that it has scarcely observed the mournful ravages of death at home which have disappeared in our own city, carried away by the tide which never returns to victory. The repose for a few short months over, is both painful and amazing. The dear old friends bound to us by many pleasant and grateful associations—wandering from our right, rendering mighty task we are rapidly entitled to. We are bound to our country, and to those who have given us so much, that another name has been added to the catalogue of those whom we loved and honored. The death of Isaac Woods, in the vigor of a manhood nobly and gallantly touched by the hand of God, has left a void in many hearts. His character was such as to command the respect and admiration of all who knew him. His conduct in the field was a guarantee. His boldness, his energy, without realizing the presence of a mind governed by high principle, and "moved by no desire but to do his duty," made him a decided, fearless fighter, whose contemptuous and disdainful bearing in the field was a source of pride to his men, and gave them courage. His death was a loss to the cause, but it was matched in his life that even those who differed from his lost more of their respect.

When the rebellion began, he instantly took his place with the patriotic throng who could not be won over to the traitor's cause, and entered every action with spirit and dash. He died first, over the dead heart of his comrade, and his last words were the words of a soldier, "I am here to serve my country."

The rebel boy was arrested at Martinsburg, Va., last night, by Capt. Johnson's detectives, and was lodged in his old place in the old Capitol prison. It will be remembered that he was sent to Richmond some months since with orders not to come back.

He had been here ever since, and his conduct, his feelings strongly, and his interest in any cause he might be asked to defend, were known to all.

He was a strong Republican in politics, and deserved a high rank in the ranks of the Union army.

A special to the World, dated Washington, Aug. 25, says:

**Arrest of Pichl, the Forger.**

We have already published the facts connected with the forgery lately committed by John L. Pichl, of this city, upon the oldest Bank of Baltimore, whereby he swindled that bank out of \$35,000 in cash.

Admirers of the army note that nothing has been done to arrest him.

It seems quite plain that he has no intention of crossing the Rapidan, most of his money having been sent to him by the rebels.

It is reported that he has still \$10,000 in his pocket book, and is engaged in numerous other transactions of a disreputable character, if not in the pay of the rebels, but it is not yet known whether Pichl had negotiated the funds or not.

Now what we observe is that the rebels were determined to get him out of his family in this city, urging them to go to join the rebels. They left him on Friday last, and his last letter to his wife, dated Saturday, and spend his ill-gotten gains abroad. He is a German Jew, and had been residing here for two years.

We understand that he long since forged the name of Joshua Blaebach, but, to a noted man which he drew the money, but a little later forged the name of John L. Pichl, and also forged the name of his partner.

He also forged the name of his son-in-law, Captain M. H. Phillips, and others were present to see him off. The rebels will probably reach him in a few days, and spend his ill-gotten gains abroad.

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
