Mr. J. Walton, on behalf of the committee to prepare legal advice in reference to the proposed laws for the coal trade, reported that he had consulted with George P. Hamilton, Esq. That gentleman, however, declined to give a decision upon the merits of the question, but he informed the committee that the proper course to pursue would be to apply for an injunction against the law before it was passed.

The Chairman handed a letter from Mr. Captain Batcher, in which he stated that he had not yet received any instructions from the Secretary of the Treasury. He therefore recommended that the meeting adjourn until Tuesday afternoon, by which time he might have some official information from him.
