A Monthly Meeting  
The meeting of the directors of the Pittsburgh and West Virginia Railway Company, held on Friday evening last, was one of the most interesting of the kind ever held in this city. The subject of raising bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000, for the purpose of completing the line from this city to Parkersburg, was the main topic of discussion. The directors, after a long and animated discussion, have decided to issue the bonds in five-year installments of \$200,000 each, and to pay interest on the same at the rate of six per cent per annum. This decision was received with great satisfaction by the public, and it is believed that the completion of the line will be accomplished in a few years.

When we last reported on the twenty-first, it was found that the directors of the Pittsburgh and West Virginia Railway Company, had decided to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000, for the purpose of completing the line from this city to Parkersburg. The directors, after a long and animated discussion, have decided to issue the bonds in five-year installments of \$200,000 each, and to pay interest on the same at the rate of six per cent per annum.
