The New York papers all oppose the rais mg of new regiments of one year voluncore to be counted in the quota in the ensuog draft, begause, as they allege, new troops officered by green officers are not by any ctive as the same number of troops would be in old regimen's. And yet so same papers are bliarous' over the fact that the men in the one hundred days' regiments raised in that State are to be exempted from the draft while in service, and are extremely keen to get these green regiments days' men into the old regiments, as well as the one year's men?

It may be true, as a general rule, that the same number of men, put into old regiments, would be more effective than the same number of mon put into new regiments; but it is to be rue in mind as equally true, as a rule, that volunteer is more gerviceable than a draft such more rapidly for new regiments than forold ones. If the raising of new regiments, herefore, will promote volunteering, the balance, in effectivenes, is on their side. In the very papers which cry out against vaising new regiments, we find abundant evi-

dence that the efforts, to raise volunteers for the old regiments in New York is a failure. The Evening Post Bays: "The facts should be understood. We are how collisting an average of twenty to thirty man per day. Thirty-three working days interfere between the present time and the date of the expected draft. Many of the recruits are likely to be men who have seen Fervice, of whom there is an abundant supply, just now, from lately mustered out regiments, and in every case, so far, that his come to our knowledge, none but men who have served three years in the field are trying to raise companies. The prospect is that these new regiments will be efficied with the very best and most experienced men. In fact, the occasion affords an excellent chance to men who had no opportunity for promotion in the three years' service, and yet are well qualified to command, to raise companies and take many

of their old comrades with them. Altogether we think the cavil at these new regiments absurd and g oundless, and we hope the War Department will pay no attention to it.
