By the new revenue law, each box or block of matches requires a stamp. The whole value cannot be placed upon the package of boxes or blocks. This adds materially to the labor and cost expended upon the matches, and comsequently enhances their price. The day of panny matches, or of two for three cents, has gone by. The new regulation takes effect on the lat of September, and the tax on each box is one cent. By the time the revenue law is again amended, a pecula stamp will perhaps be ordered for each match.

The Result of the Explosion.

At 5:30 the charge was made and the fort, with part of the line on each side, was carried in a stule to redect oredit upon the vaterans engaged in the charge. It was decidedly a brilliant affair. Cur Losses in the Late Assault.

Headquarters Army of the Potomac, July 31st, 1864. }
The exact loss of the battle of yesterday is not officially learned. It is beliaved to be twenty five hundred, exclusive of the missing. Large numbers of wounded are lying between the two lines that cannot yet be removed. Gen. Butler sent a flag of truce to-day to the rebel lines, but it was peremptorily refused by the rebel officers. They also refused to ex change newspapers. Many believe that either their lines are very weak or they have some extensive movement shost, and are straid of it being known; the raid into Pennsylvania may be the reason. The lines of both armies are about the same as before the last battle.
