What Are We Doing?

I read a week ago yesterday that the people of this city, in view of the exposure to a raid of the enemy, had appointed a committee of public safety. Since then the report, which gave rise to the sense of danger, had passed away, and another impulse had been given to the mind of the people.

The committee appointed at that meeting, to work for the city, and also to be a committee of public safety, has been steadily laboring with an eye single to the good of the city. It has consulted with the military authorities, and has been in communication with every branch of the government.

The first step to be taken in providing for the public defense is to obtain men, and the first thing the committee did was to organize with Gen. Grant in devising a plan to raise the necessary force. The plan adopted was to enroll all the servicable men in the county and divide them into classes.

The committee has been going on during the past week. The money to pay the expenses of this enrollment was raised by private subscriptions, and we learn that in the cities and neighborhoods, and in some of the townships, the enrollment is very full and satisfactory.
