Spirits, a uat OH and fobacco The fellowing decision has been rendered by Mr. Lewis, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, in regard to the liability of distilled spirits; ceal oil, and tobacco, in possession of the manafac-turer on the ist of July, 1864, to taxation under

the net of Jane 30th, 1864:

From various letters received at this office, it recems that great diversity of opticion exists among the officers of Internal revenue, and other parties interested, in regard to the construction given to the 55th section of the act of June 30th, in the circular of July 6. By the 55th restion, all spirits which may have been in the possession of the distiller, or in publicators or bonded manchouse, on the 1st day of July, no duty having been paid thereon, shall be held and treated at if citalized on that day. By the 1734 section, it is also provided that "all manufactures and productures and productions on which a duty was im-

have been manufactured or produced after such date."

These provisions are to be construded together, as the last includes the first, and both cover the same ground. They plainty apply to distilled spirits, which were, on the lat of July, in the possession of the distiller and manufacturer, or in any pathlic store or bonded warehouse, and expirits adapped under the old law in bills of ladding. It no tax had been paid prior to July 1, no quiestion of size or removar could infervence, if the spirits of that day were in the pastession of the distiller, or in public store or bonded warehouse, but he must pay the increased rate. Cosi oil and tobaccow when bonded, are, by both the old and new law, subject to the same regulations and liabilities as distilled

spirits. The old law provided that spirits and oil should become subject to tax when sold, consumed, or removed for consumption or sale, and tobacco, when sold, or removed for consumption, or for delivery to others than agents of the manufacturer or producer, but not when bonded
