SHERIDAN'S! GREAT VICTORY. BARLY RETREATING TOWARDS LYNCHBURG. Sheridan's Headquarters One Hile

Beyond Strasburg. ---OUR CAPTURES OVER 4.000. One-Third of Early's Forces Captured.

are in Itil retreat toward Lynchburg. Sheri-dan's headquatters, last evening, were one mile cryend Strasburg. Many robel stragglers have swell the total number of our captures to over 4,000, exclusive of wounded, which numbers about 3,200. It is a fair estimate that Early loss at least

one third of his entire force in the battle of Monday. We captured about 150 commissioned offi-cers, from Colonels down to 2d Lieutenants. The demoralisation of Early's forces is complete, and he is making Richmondward as fast as his legs can carry him. It is possible that Sheridan by his close pursuit may succeed in bringing him to a stand and force him to deliver battle, but judging from present indications such will not be the case.

The only point this side of Stanton where the

ebels can make a stand with any hope of succoos, is at Fisher's Meuntain, two and a half miles beyond Strasburg. The position there is naturally a very strong one, and admirably adopted for defence. It cannot be flinked except by a column marching through the Luray valley, work of some days. The disadvantage of such a movement would be in the weakening of our onere and the liability of the flanking party to dedeat and rout, unless it was very strong, and Sheridan cannot spare any considerable on for any such expedition.

If Early continues his rotreat the demoraliza-tion of his army will continue to increase, for he will be vigorously pressed on both danks and rear by our cavalry, who are comparatively nieso and in excession: spirit. RUMORED PRACE PROFESITION. A rumor is in circulation here so circumstantial as to merit repitition, at least, if not full redence, of which the following is the substance : It is said that Jeff, Davis has forwarded to ex-Secretary Jacob Thompson, of Mississippi, now residing at Niagara Palls, authority to submit a proposition to our Government, to disband armies and return to allegiance, and universal imnesty be granted, and slaves, still held as such, to remain in slavery; but slaves actually freed by the operations of the war to remain free. The same latter by Davis on this subject, the rumor goes on to state, was given to a lead-Democrat in New York, to be presented to Mr. Lincoln.
