6 000 Rebels Prisoners MARY OF THEM WISH TO TAKE THE DATH. Destruction of Early's Army

LER CANNOT SPARE A MAN. Lynchburg Must Fall.

Pittaburgh Gazette WASHINGTON, Sept. 25. The following dispatches have just been recoived at this Bureau from our correspondents at coneral Sheridan's headquarters and at Winchester: Woodstock, Va., Sept. 34-10 a. m. Our victory is gamplete. The feets of all the rmies of the rebellion, the corps that was so often led to victory by Stonewall Jackson, and which till a week ago, retained all the splendid drill and magn.ficont confidence, that great leader had given it, is to day, disorganized, demoril sed, stripped of three fourths of its artillery and many of its best officers, and fleeing not fo tronger positions, but for final escape.

The best evidence of the completences of our

victory is the number of rebal officers we have taken up to to-day. We may fairly estimate this number, excluding the wounded, and counting only the well officers who have fallen into our hands, at 303. Besides these, the wounded officers taken prisoners are largely in excess of the ordinary proportion between them and the Such of Early's army as was recruited in the
