Price's Retreat.

So little communication exists between the rebeis cast and west of the Mississippi river, that the Mobile Nates still innocently tells its misguided residers that General Price has obtained a permanent footbold in Missouri, while the poor old man, with his routed and figing army, has not only been expelled from Missouri, but has given up all north of the Arkansas river. While he invaded Missouri he took with him nineteen pieces of artillery and five hundred wagons, and his army was estimated as high as forty thousand men. When he reached the Arkansas river on his disastrous retreat, he had with him two pieces of artillery, forty wagons, and fifteen thousand demoralized and almost starving men. Some of his men are reported to have actually died of starvation, which is easy to believe, as on, his line of retreat he was away from all his communications, and by losing his wagons his army was deprived of its supplies. Curtis never stopped a day after he came in contact with Price at Kansas City, but fought him and passed the Arkansas river. The Union Cherokee troops fought well in the conflicts with Price. The whole road traversed by Price in his retreat is strewn with broken down horses, wagons and munitions of war. Price is supplosed to have retired beyond the Red river to rejoin Kirby. It may truly be said that there never was a war of any kind conducted under so many disadvantages meekly and quietly borne as our war against the rebels. They conduct the war as plintes on the ocean and as incendiaries on land, and yet expect to be treated as belligarents, and we find their claims supported in every way by the crowned heads of some of the most important powers of the world. International law is tortured for pleas to interfere in their behalf by the very nations whose laws are allowed to be evaded in every possible way, that we may be injured. If, in ridding the earth of a plinte, neutral waters are invaded, an emphatic 'protest' is called for from neutral nations. But if those very pirates take refuge in neutral territory, or, perhaps, have been hired to murder and burn and rob in neutral territory, they are shielded and applauded, instead of being given up to a felon's doom. This is so marked, that ours is beginning to be felt throughout the civilized world not as a war between two sets of principles, one for the extension of human slavery and the other opposed to it, but as a war of aristocracy throughout the world against liberty and all liberal government, and it is rapidly becoming recognized as on our part, a war for the preservation of order against robbery, piracy, murder, arson, and every crimagning humanity, in the worts forms.
