SHERMAM'S MARCH. The letter from a captain of a stea the Savannah river, published in the New York papers of Saturday and dated Nov. 27, stating that Gen. SHERMAN was at o near Savannah, has not been confirmed by the arrival of the Fulton, from Port Royal with dates to Nov. 80th, and the story was doubtless one of the numberless canards a ways flying about through a fleet or an army The New York Econing Post of Saturday

As the Fulton brings us five days' later news than this, it is evident that the news by fleg of truce was fraudulent. An Augustadispatch of the 26th ult. in a Richmond paper, saysthat Gen. SHERMAN's army was 45 outh of Augusta, and so far has not been baffled.

This is probably true, and is the latest news we have from Sherman. But if he was only forty five miles south of Augusta on the 26th, he had still one hundred and thirty miles to traverse before he could read Savanuah, and that would take him ten days, so that he cannot be there before to

day or to morrow.

That Gen. Sherman was expected to arrive soon, in the neighborhood of Port Royal, is evident from the news by the Fulion. Gen. Fosjer was getting up an expedition of unknown; but in all probability it was destined for the main land (our forces occupying only the islands on the coast near the borders of Georgia and South Carolina,) to co-operate with Sherman. He might do this effectually by cutting the rail-road between Charleston and Savannah; and Gen. Sher-man, even if he failed of taking Savannah, at the first trial could reach a new base of supplies where this railroad crosses Broad River, a short distance above Hilton Head, and about half way between Charleston and Savannah, from which he could operate

against both those places. But it is useless to speculate. It is certain that SHERMAN was not in Savannal as late as the 30th ult., and that he could not reach there, at his previous rate of marching, before the 5th or 6th of December. We may therefore soon expect to hear
