The New Chief Justice.

Five years ago, had any one suggested Salmon P. Chase as the probable successor of Roger B. Tancy in the most responsible and eminent position of Chief Justice of the United States, he would have been regarded as in need of a strait jacket. The chasm that separated the late from the present incumbent of that station is wider than that spanned by the twelty years sloop of Rip Van Winkle, to which he lay down a loyal subject of King George and awoke a fellow citizen of 'President Washington. The death of Judge Tancy doring the night following the popular vote whereby Maryland was made a Free State marked the close of an era; the accession of Judge Chase marks like commencement of another. The passing away of the one, the opening of the other, occur in the midst of a gigantic civil convaision which has piled the earth with its slain and filled the sky with the smoke of its confingrations; but we need not doubt that the angry clouds of battle and havoe will be filluminated by the bow of conciliation and peace.

The position of Chief Justice has been filled, since it has been created by the Federal Constitution, by four persons, namely, 1. John Jay of New York; 2. Oliver Ellsworth of Connecticut; 3. John Marshall, of Virginia; 5. Roger, B. Tancy of Maryland, Messre, Jay, and Ellsworth were respectively hominated by Washington; and each resigned after serving for a few years only; Judge Marshall, was nominated by John Adams just before his retirement from the Prosidency; and Judge Tancy by General Jackson, in the latter half of his second, term. Borax to Kill Water Bugs.—At the fast meeting of the Boston Society of Natural History, a report was made by a member upon the effect of pulverized borax upon the water bugs and cockroaches that infest our houces. The experiment was made by sprinkling it around every crack and erevice suspected of affording shelter to these insects, with this effect: that after three or four days quantities of dead ones were found on the doors, and hardly a live one found in the house. Another experiment was tried by contining two healthy specimens in a bottle, with a little borax at the bottom of it, with air freely admitted. At he end of twenty-four hours one was found dead, the other quite feeble; in thirty-six hours the last one was also dead. Thus proving this simple and perfect remedy, the value of which most house-keepers will appreciate.
