LOCAL BOUNTIES AND DESERTION. The effect of offering large local bounties in conjunction with the immunity shows to deserters by the General Government, i shown in a memorial lately addressed to Congress by the Union League of Philadelphia. The League expresses the opinion that the system of local bounties is fraught with enormous evils and should be on the authority of the City Bounty Fund Committee, (whose formal endorsement of the memorial is appended to it); that of the recipients of the city's bounty, not one fourth ever reach the army! Desertion upon this scale is something altogether unprecodented in the history of the world. It is ascribable to the almost absolute impunity which attends desertion, and this is so complete that "bounty-jumping" has become a regular business, by which many scoundrels have acquired a moderate independence. The Union League refers to an instance of an individual who is known to have enlisted and deserted six times, and who now walks the streets of Philadelphia openly and definally. As the bounties paid in different parts of the country have varied from \$500 to \$1,500, the business pays exceedingly well, and agencies have been opened for instructing and assisting men in this honest and patriotic calling. The same memorial recipients of the city's bounty that actually reached the front, a considerable number deserted at the first opportunity, there being some understanding by which the rebels let ere men back through our lines. Once

through, they are ready to enlist again, and so on over and over again. It will thus be seen that the high local Lourilles operate as a stimulus to desertion, the descripts feeling conscious that they will not be Limished for desertion, even it arrested for it. The abandonment of local bounties and the increased severity in the punishment of descriton, would cure this evil, especially if the vicious plan of credbest, instead of those in which they reside, were abandoned along with the local bounty system. Congress cannot too soon give its attention to this matter.
