WORTHLESS SUBSTITUTES. The New York Times quotes the statement that of three detachments of substitutes sent from Concord, N. H., to join the Fifth New Hampshire Volunteers, amounting to 625 men, 137 deserted on the passage, leaving only 488 to arrive at the regiment. Of the 488 who got to the regiment and were assigned to companies, 83 deserted to the enemy from picket line; 36 deserted to the rear; 4 have been discharged as utterly worthless, their physical incapacity being so glaring, and of such long standing, that they must have been known at the time of enlistment; five have been sent back to Concord to have their cases of enlistment investigated, by order of the War Department; and two have been discharged by order of the War Department. Thus, out of 525 of these bounty-tempted warriors sent to one regiment only since August last, there

It is high time, then, that "the Eastern "States" should abandon, or be compelled to abandon, a system so disgraceful to them and so injurious to the army. Massachusectis, Maine, New Hampshire, and the other Eastern States, (including New York, New Jersey, and the city of Philadelphia,) have been much praised, hitherto, for the prompt and patriotic manner in which they have answered the catls upon them for men; but the truth is now coming to light that, instead of filling up their depleted regiments with patriotic volunteers, they have been sending forward nothing but villainous mercenaries emptying jails and poor-houses sweeping the vilest haunts of the cities, and gathering all the scum and refuse within reach, to fill up their quotas. They did not care what kinds of men were sent, nor how the thing was done; all that they were anxious about was to see that the Provost Marshal gave them credit for so many men; and thus the people of "the Eastern States" got rid of nearly all share in the war, and were left at home to pursue unmoleste their schemes of money-getting. "If these practises are persisted in; if individuals, as well as officials, do not bring some conscience, some sonse of duty to bear fon this lusiness of filling quotas, we have no difficulty in predicting what the consequence will be. The Government will be forced into abolishing the whole system of substitutes, and, as a last resort, dictated by an imperative regard for the national safety, forcing every draded man to take his place. forcing every drafted man to take his place in the ranks. It is desirable on every ac count that this should be avoided as long possible. We are not of the number those who think we ought to imitate the rains of the South and the firm of the South and the state of possible. We are not of the number of those who think we ought to initiate the action of the South, and convert our whole territory into a camp. We are satisfied that we owe a large portion of the case with which the Northern States have so far supported the burdens of the war, to the palms which have been taken to protect our social system and our business reasisms from all avoidable disturbance; and we think it highly desimble that we should persist in these precentions as long as possible, and should be supported to the state of course. !! I am sorry to inform you of the gloomy state of public feeling here, with regard to the future. You will, no doubt, be surprised at my writing thus after what I have previously written to you. But the fact is that the fall of Atlants was a fearful blow to the Confederacy, and the public mind is thoroughly prostrated in consequence. At present, we just indulge in a kind of forforn hope, on the strength of Hood's new move in Tennesses, but I am personally afraid no good will result from it. Despair is settling upon the people generally, and I firmly believe that if they were left to themselves they would accept terms and re-enter the Union, as the only alternative to national ruin. Property of every kind is becoming more worthless every day. Gold and steriling are the only safe things to invest in; and these command mean laternative to very little of the precious metal is obtainable even at this rate. People are anxious to run as little risk as possible, and to avoid sacrificing more than they can help in the general crash which is impending and inevitable. I confess my faith in the ultimate success of the Confederacy is greatly weakened. I had strong hopes of the existence of a disposition on the part of the Northean people generally (or at least of a large proportion) to favor peace on less rigid conditions than Lincoln's propositions; but the result of the recent elections in the North; has banished this thought. If the Captain of the Wachusett were eally deserving of this mark of approval, he would not have needed any rom the Consul; and the simple fact that he did not act until he was "urged" should have given the Chamber of Commerce pause before pouring out their thanks to him exclusively. Men who have the soul to do noteworthy deeds do not need urging to bring them up to the scratch.

The truth is, Captain Collins had really o stomach for this fight. If he is ever rought to court martial, he can plead, successfully, that he was averse to it from the start; that he resisted it as long as he could; and that he was in a manner driver to it by the persistence of the Consul and the other officers of his ship. FOREIGN RECOGNITION. The Montreal Telegraph, of January 3d,

Rumors have been prevalent for som ime of an increase to the imperial military orce in Canada. It is now stated in miliary and other well informed circles that the Coldstream Gazada and active the conditions of the condition of the conditions of the Coldstream Guards and other regiments, to the number of 10,000 men, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to the number of 10,000. The reason given in the same circles for this movement is the intention of the Governments of France and Great-Britain, on the inauguration of Mr. Lincoln in March next, to recognize him as the President only of those States for which he has been elected, thus officially affirming the disunion of the formerly United States, spoken of by Earl Russell in his letter to the Confederate Commissioners.

This rumor, in all probability, comes from the rebel agents in that city, and is evidently suggested from Richmond to co incide with the proposal, in that quarter, to submit to a foreign protectorate. The Montreal Gazette, of January 4th, contradicts the rumor flatly. It says: A rumor has been current in this city for

A rumor has been current in this city for three or four days that a number of fresh regiments, including the Coldstream Guards, had had intimation that they might prepare or be in readiness to remove to Canada; and it was understood to be current in military, citcles—in fact so positively so that every-body believed it. We learn, however, upon inquiry in a quarter which leaves us no room for doubt, that it is not true that any order has been given on the subject, or any official intimation of such a movement of troops sent to this country. This rumor was coupled with another, that on the 4th of March next, the day of the reinstallation of Mr. Abraham Lincoln in the President's chair, Great Britain and France will enly recognize him as the President of the States for which he is elected, and in that way make a recognition of the Southern Confederacy.

Lee's Extremity. The reason for the extraordinary outburst of despondency and desperation in the recent Richmond journals is to be found in the fact, that for the first time in the war the army and the people in Virginia see themselves beleaguered in carnest, and their most
necessary supplies cut off.

On the one hand Generals Stoneman, Burbridge and Gillem have destroyed the chief
sources of lead and salt in the South, slurated in southwestern Virginia. The lead
mines were blown up, and the salt wells
stopped up; all the kettles, furnness and
other machinery were at the same time destroyed, together with locomotives, trains
and displict of clothing, ammunition and provisions.

But important as this achievement of our caralry is, the work of Sherman's army has become more fatal to Lee and the rebel operations in Virginia. Even this supply was insufficient for Lee's demands, it seems; for we read that a month or six weeks, before Sherman left Atlanta for Eavannah, General Lee wrote to the pixelient of the Gulf Railroad that its capacity must be increased, or he could not maintain his army in Virginia, but would be compelled to fall back nearer to his base of supplies.

There is reason to believe, from information in possession of residents of Savananh, that Lee has not thirty days' supplies on band; and it would not be supprising if he should afternet to leave Virginia, with the petrose of concentrating all the forces of the Confederacy somewhere in South Carolina, probably near Columbin, there to fight the last great battle of the war. Such a movement would alone capble him to secure once more the interior and central position, which at present Sherman has snatched from the southern armies. It would involve, of course, the abandonment of Virginia—Lut it begins to be plain that if Lee stays in Virginia he will be caught. But with the rain which Thomas' gallant troops have indicated upon Hood's army, we have in fact, two spare armies; and no doubt Sherman and Thomas are already preparing for such movements as will meet any possible maneuvre of Lee's. The Bounty Bisiness gives a great deal of irrouble in New York. The city wishes to get out of the draft early by offering \$1,000 to a volunteer, but all the rest of the State oppose it as carrying off recruits from their localities and making the draft sit more heavily upon them. THE COMMON SCHOOLS OF THE STATE THE COMMON SCHOOLS OF THE STATE.—A report from the Superintendent of the Common Schools in the state, shows that there are 637,785 pupils in the state schools, exclusive of Philadelphia. Length of school term five months, seventeen days; average cost of each pupil, 58 cents per month. The total cost of the system is \$2,381,173, an increase over the year previous of \$97,073. This does not include the expenses of the Philadelphia Common Schools. There is a decrease of 367 male teachers, owing to the war, and an increase of 593 remale teachers.
