Organization of Allegheny Councils— Inauguration of the Mayor Elect—A Question of Eligibility Raised. At ten o'clock this morning, the mem illegheny assembled in the Select char for the purpose of receiving the returns of the rate election, inaugurating the Mayor elect, and organizing the Councils for the ensuing year. A temporary organization was effected, on motion of Mr. John Atwell, by the appointment of John Wright, Esq., as President, and Samuel kiddle as Secretary.

The returns of the late election for Mayor, Director of the Poor, and Councilmen, were then Director of the Poor,

ppened and read.
The chairman then asked the question: "Shall heec returns be approved?"
Mr. Atwell moved that the returns be appro-

Mr. Atwell moved that the returns be approved as read.

Mr. George R. Riddle objected to the returns from the Fourth Ward—not on account of any riregularity in the returns themselves, but for the reason that, under the charter of the city, as he understood it, one of the members elect was ineligible. He referred to the nineteenth section of the city charter, which provides that "no alderman of said city, nor any person holding an office of trust or profit under the laws of this Commonwenth, or the ordinances of the Select and Common Councils, the emolumenth whereof are paid out of the Treasury of the city, shall be competent to serve as a member of the Select con Common Councils, the demandal of the Common Councils, whereof are paid out of the Treasury of the city, shall be competent to serve as a member of the Select Council.

Mr. Marshall, of the Fourth Ward, was ineligible to set as a member of the Select Council.

Mr. Marshall stated that he was an involuntary candidate for the position. He had not sought the nomination, and only consented to the use of his name, at the carnest solicitation of many of his consituents. If the body would now vote him ineligible he would take it as a very great kindness.

On motion, the further discussion of the point raised was postponed until after the adjournment of the Joint Session—the Select Council being the proper judge of the eligibility of any of its members.

I lis members of both Councils present (with the exception of Mr. Marshall) were then duly

sworn by Alderman Hays.

Messrs. McBrier, Hill and Faulhauber were appointed a Committee to wait upon the Mayor elect, Hon. John Morrison, and conduct him to elect, Hon. John Morrison, and conduct him to the chamber.

Mr. Morrison soon after appeared, when he was sworld by Mr. Hays. After subscribing to the oath, Mr. Morrison spoke at some length in reference to the affairs of the city, its progress and presperity, and concluded by thanking his fellow citizens for the honor conferred, and pleag-ing himself to use his best efforts in the discharge of his duties.
