PAYMENT OF BOUNTIES BY THE STATE.

Mr. Wrison has introduced into the Senste a bill to authorize the Governor to borrow money to pay a bounty not exceeding \$300 "for each volunteer and for each man who has or may put in a substitute? under the pending call for 300,000 men, prowided that no more is paid than is sufficient to fill the quota of the Biate. The bill, of course, repeals all laws authorizing local laxation for such bountles. If the volunteers are to be raised by boun-

tics. and the bounty money is to be mised by taxation, this seems to us as good a plan as any, leaving the constitutional ques tion out of view. 'We say "if;" for it all hangs on the contingencies we have named. Some districts are opposed to the bounty system, altogether, and others to raising bounty money by taxation ; and so long as this is the case, it might seem that it would be best to leave to those who are willing, the task of taxing themselves.

The bill involves an addition to the State deht of about \$15,000,000; and that would be so much of the present burthen shoved off on to postcrity. It would add besides about a million to the yearly expenses of the State, and render necessary an increase of Biate tax nearly double that now levied. If the plan proposed be constitutional, it is for the people to say whether they are willing to shoulder that additional load, or prefer

the methods heretofore pursued. But the constitutional difficulty in the way of this bill is the great stumbling block, and is not overcome by anything presented in the bill itself. The preamble endeavors
