RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCE. The Corresponding Secretaries, Drs. Holdich and Taylor, of the American Bibl Society, have published for the information of the friends of this Institution, an exhibit of itsalfairs extending over a period of eight months of the year 1864, from April 1st to December 1st, inclusive. The main features of the paper are as follows: Receipts from all sources, \$407,891 06. Issues of Bibles Testaments, and Portions, 1,042,280 columes. Grants in books have been 412,033 volumes. Of these donations we may specify the following, viz: To the Army and Navy, Hospitals, Gunboats, and returned Prisoners of War, 280,854; to the South, for troops and people, \$1,660; to Prisoners of War, 32,648; Southern Refugees, 570; to the Freed People, 24,783; to Sabbath Schools, 6, 100; to Sailors and Boatmen, 6,007; Misodiancous, 19,543. The United States Christian Commission have received grants for distribution in the Army and Navy amounting to 227,035 volumes. In Foreign Work grants in books from the Bible House have been 17,060 volumes. Of these we specify the following, viz: Of Cherokee Testaments, 3,000; for Japan, 1,260; Africa, 3,292; South America, 1,182; Mexico, 0,000. Besides

these, books are now being printed on behalf of this Society in various parts of the world, as in Turkey, India, China, Italy, Germany and Russia. Electrotype plates are new in preparation for a Hawailan Family Bible, and for a Dacota Testament; while the plates of the Arabic Bible alone are estimated to cost about \$85,000. Plates are also in preparation for the Old Slavic Testament, and the Slavic and Bulgarian Testament - Agencies of the Society in Mexico, South America, and the Levant, are successful. Owing to the large grants by the Board, increased cost of material and manufacture, rate of exchange, &c., the expenses during the past eight months of this fiscal year have exceeded those of the corresponding period of the past year by about \$45,000. Mutilated Postal Currency. Some misapprehension may have been creat with reference to the redemption of mutilated postal currency, or notes so much torn and defaced as to render it next to impossible to decide whether they are genuine er counterfeit. An article has been quite extensively capied into the papers stating that postmasters were bound to redeem mutilated currency, provided no doubt of its genuineness existed, and provided that not of its genulneness existed, and provided that not more than one-tenth part of the mutiliated note was missing. Such notes or currency—undoubtedly genuine, and not more than one-tenth of currency notes, or one-twentieth of Treasury notes—are a legal tender; postmasters, like all other postle, are bound to receive them; and only because such notes are United States money, undoubtedly genuine. Postmasters have no means of using defaced or mutilated notes which is not common to all, and all counterful currency or Treasury notes taken by any Government official is the loss of such official. The Government makes no allowances for such loss. Hence the unfairness of expecting an officer of the government to become the receiving agent of dirty, defaced, or mutilated fractional currency, the genuin eness of which cannot be decided by the most expert.

The Government has provided for the redomption of all mutilated governmental currency; the rule is that all such shall be returned to the Treasury Department through a government depoilary—such as the Custom House, or a National Bank—in sums of not less than five dollars. If the currency or note is genuine, the Treasury Department will send new notes for the amount returned. If more than one-tenth of currency, or one-twentieth of Treasury notes be missing, the Department will deduct from the face value of such note, the proportional value of what is missing.

It is, therefore, the duty of the holder of untillated notes to bear his own risk and loss, and it is not the duty of any innoceat party to bear the risks of others. All mutilated notes should be deposited with a government depository for redemption, and thus retired from circulation. Those who are careless enough to take such notes, have no cause of complaint if others, who are more careful, shall deady days' delay, can have the money redeemed by the Treasury, as above stated.
