They have deliged the country with the most improbable and ridiculous rumors, heedless altogether of their probability. If they have not had a good time of it, in ele-

culating startling reports, it was not for want of trying. Prominent among their sensations were two or three articles that appeared in the Washington Chronicle, which they delighted to transmit as having an official character, the Chroniele, according to thein, leing the reflex of the President's views. Now the Washington Chronicle is an excellent paper, and its editor is personally intimate with the President, but it is not the President's organ, nor does it affect to speak for him. The President has no organ. Other President have had, but Mr. Likecolk is a very reticent man, who says but little, even to his Cabinet. On this occasion it is notorious that his Cabinet knew nothing of his views; and how a newspaper man should be supposed to know.

endowment by the State was as large as the Commonwealth could then afford to make it, but not as large as was necessary for the object centemplated by that endowment; and now that the State is in a condition, through the munificence of the general government, to make up the lack, and raise the institution to the level of its purpose, establishing it upon a sure basis as a University in name and in fact, there should be no question of diverting this fund to other chunnels.
