"A citizen by the name of Watkins, who has just arrived here from a point fifty miles southwest of Atlanta and a man of spirarent truthfulness, informs me that most of Hood sarmy passed Opelika, Ala., on the 27th of January, en route for Branchville, B. C.: by way of Columbus, Ga. He also says that there is a large force of negroes with a number of teams at work repairing the failtroad between Atlanta and the Knowah river, and that this force is guaded by a small body of cavalry, who could easily be fouled by a single brigade. The department here has been fully advised of this and no doubt will look to it. Watkins says that it is generally believed through Southern Georgia and Alabama that the rebels will surrender Mobile, and virtually give up all that portion of the South that lies south of the Savannah river, and concentrate all their available force against Sherman and Grant. From the movements around Eastport, I think Mr. Watkins' story is correct."
