His sole reliance, now, is upon the country that lies between Columbia and Richmond which embraces only North Carolina and s part of Virginia; and how long that rece is to be left him depends upon SHER MAN's future course.

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Columbia being the key to both Charles. ton and Richmond, it will of course be occupied permanently, or so long as it is of importance. The fall of Charleston follows that of Columbia, inevitably. The enemy were already exacuating it, and we presume our forces occupied it within a day or two after Columbia fell in our hands. This will release the large force under Gen. GILMORE, near Charleston. Gen. SHER-MAN being thus reinforced, will be able to push on his victorious column without delay. He is, as we have shown, half way to Wilmington, at Columbia; and as BEAURE-OARD was unable to make a stand against him, there, we do not suppose he will make one at any other point. The Congaree was not the last ditch to be sure; but if out ditch after another is given up without a blow, there cannot be much fighting, ever

when the last ditch is found. The war is now practically confined to North Carolina and Virginia.
