THE PALL OF CHARLESTON. The public did not seem a whit surprise yesterday, to learn that Charleston had fallen into our hands. It had come to be a matter of course, and results of great mar nitude are happening to fast that this one excited no surprise.

And yet, it is the event we have all been longing for from the start. There has been in the northern heart, an intense yearning to get hold of Charleston. That yearning is now gratified; but its gratification has been so long delayed that the victory cre ates much less joy than might have been

The fathers of secession are fugitives, and the birthplace of rebellion has fallen into the hands of the hated Yankees. The knowledge of its fate mus strike home like a dagger to the hearts of only Charleston, but South Carolina, has fallen; and with South Carolina the rebellion falls. The hour of its doom is fast approaching.

But where were the "chivalry" of South Carolina, that they allowed the State to fall into our hands without a blow? The te was to strip itself, and, baring its giant sinews, lay hold on Sherman and crush im; but it did not. And why not? Was all the boast of pluck, on the part of that State, mere bluster? It would seem so. There has not been enough grit in its sons to raise one hand against Sherman. Alas for the boasting, braggart, fire-cating State! How is she humbled and brought low She could incite the entire South to rebellion; but she could not lift an arm in her own defence!

THE WRONG DONE TO THE CON-NELLSVILLE RAILROAD. The act of Assembly passed at the session vania Railway Company." divested the Connellsville Raiiroad Company of a large part of its franchises, and transferred them to the former company. This extraordinary piece of legislation, by which a great wrong was done to an energetic and struggling company, which had made good progress in the great enterprise which it was created to accomplish, excited much surprise and some Indignation at the time. The prime object of the Connelliatile road
was to open a direct communication between this city—which has such numerous ural and artificial with the Great Westand the cities of Baltimore and Washington. The secondary object was to open an easy and direct avenue to a region exceedingly rich in soil, minerals and timber throughou all that portion of our State lying south of Pittsburgh. The first object is of national importance; the importance of the second is of itself such as to warrant the construction of the road were there no other. The two combined make this one of the most important enterprises ever undertaken in this commonwealth. This original programme ought under no circumstances to be relinquished by the people of this city, or by those of the section of our State

through which the road is designed to pass. The line of the Connellsville road begins at this city and terminates at Cumberland, in Maryland, where it intersects with the Baltimore and Ohio road a few miles south of the Pennsylvania line. From this city to Connellsville it is completed and is in full operation. From Connellsville to Cumberland the distance is about ninety miles other discovered route is the summit between the Atlantic and the Western slopes so low, or the grade so easy. Upon this section the Company has expended about half a million of dollars. The Sand Patch tunnel, the most formidable part of the work, is half finished, and can be complet-

The line crosses several mountain ranges and intervening valleys. The coal veins are very extensive. and of unparalleled thickness and purity. One vein on the road is twenty-six feet in thickness, remarkably free from sulphu and therefore betteradapted to the manufac ture of coke for smelting purposes than any other that is known. The great coal min alout Connellsville are but the northern border of this extensive field. Iron or abounds all along the line. Timber of the finest quality grows all along the line of the road, the value of which to these cities, for boatbuilding and all other purposes, can hardly be over-estimated.
