APPROPRIATION BILL PASSED BY THE HOUSE.

Special Message of President Lincoln.

Hannibal, March 1, 1862.

Mr. Graham presented a resolution, from citizens of Allegheny, against the repeal of the act extending the water works; also, a bill to levy per capita tax in the Sixth Ward, Pitts-burgh.

Mr. Davis, a bill increasing the contributions of Westmoreland.

Mr. Hoge read a bill incorporating the follow-ing railroad companies: Mill Creek, East Bay Creek and Punxsutawney and Roselle.

The bill introduced by Major Dodge had not been referred and the resolution asking his removal, were consequently postponed indefinitely.

Mr. Graham presented a bill authorizing a committee of the Second Ward, Allegheny, which passed.

The following bills also passed: Consolidated Jefferson and Washington Colleges, relative to use of tunnels and bridges by railroad compa-nies other than those who constructed them; in-crease in the amount of money to be expended to road, to run "Franklin" to the coal fields in Butler.

Adjourned until Tuesday.
