WHAT CONGRESS DID. Eoth houses of Congress adjourned finally on Saturday morning, but the telegraph does not give us a clear conception of the shape in which the various bills of public interest were passed. From what we can All the appropriation bills passed, the

Senate yielding its opposition to the clause in the Deficiency bill giving extra pay to the employees of the House of Representative None of the bills increasing the pay of the army, or of army officers, passed; but we find in the report of the House proceedings on Friday night, the following:

impossible now to tell. The bill to incorporate the Freedmen's Savings and Trust Company passed, as did also the bill restricting the circulation of the National Banks. The latter bill reduces the percentage of notes to be issued in a descending ratio from 90 to 60 per cent., in proportion to the increase of capital from \$200,000 to \$1,000,000.

The amended Tariff bill was passed pretty much as it came from the House. Wrought aron tubes are taxed 24 cents per pound, and the duly on railroad fron is reduced from 15 to 10 cents per 100 pounds. Machinery for the manufactory of fabrics made from hemp and linen may be imported duty free for one year.

The bill to regulate commercial intercourse with insurrectionary States, passed with amendments. It repeals Section 8 of

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the act of July 2, 1864. places the interests of freedmen and white refugees upon an equal footing, under the direction of the Secretary or War, instead f making: it an independent bureau. It limits the number of assistant commissioners to ten, or one instead of two in each insurrectionary State; and provides for the renting of lands in lots of forty acres each, to allivators, black and white, with an oppornity for their purchase at the end of years, at a moderate price? The Exchange of Prisoners-Their Fear-WILMINGTON, N. C., Feb. 27, 1865.

EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS. Arrangements having been complete for the delivery of some ten thousand of or men by exchange, at a point ten miles above Wilmington, the steamer Jame Christopher, this morning, received on bourd at the bridge and brought down sone four hundred. During the day others, to the number of two thousand, have come in, marching from the Rebel line, where they passed from captivity once more under the protection of the old fing. They sent up a faint cheer—the best which their wasted up a faint cheer—the best which their wasted energies could give out, when they came in sight of the Stars and Stripes. The boat carried a white flag forward, and a handsome American ensign aft. These men represent almost every portion of the great Union army, and are from nearly every State. They went with joy when they found themselves free irom the ciutches of the enemy and under Uncio Sam's protection. The long funeral processions, as they came into the city, caused a shudder of horror among all classes, and particularly arrong the Union officers and men, who found, here and there, some old comrade or acquaintance.

SYSTEMATIC CHUELTY TOWARD UNION PRIS-Some assert that the rebelsare not able to do any better. If this is the best they can do for mankind, then surely the bastard Confederacy is upon its last legs. The statement is almost incrediit is not in the statement is almost incredi-lic, and would be quite to bit torthose hun-dreas of wasted and dying men who are thrust into our lines after long months of imprisonment in "bull pens" and other pris-ons for exchange. For all this we'return good for evil. Witness the treatment of relel prisoners in our lands. Not only their physical but their mental powers have given way under the terrible and prolonged sufferings. Some with whom Dr. Buzzell conversed had a dip recollection only of the time they had been prisoners, but they could not tell their own names, the regiment they I clonged to, or the place of their birth. And yet there was no disease to account for this terrible inroad upon the mental powers. They had become demented by protracted sufering and exposure, and by lack of nour-ishment.— N. Y. Tribune.
